I am pleased to present the 2026-2029 Sioux Lookout Detachment Action Plan. This action plan has been prepared and adopted per the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA) and in alignment with the Ontario Provincial Police 2026-2029 Strategic Plan.



The 2026-2029 Sioux Lookout Detachment Action Plan outlines commitments, actions, and desired outcomes for the detachment over the next four years. It addresses how we will provide adequate and effective policing in our area and will meet the needs of the communities we serve. To reflect these priorities, the plan is organized in three sections:

- Crime
- Roadways, Waterways and Trails
- Community Well-Being

The plan also includes qualitative and quantitative performance objectives and indicators so we can appropriately measure the outcomes of our actions.

The 2026-2029 Sioux Lookout Detachment Action Plan was created in consultation with relevant stakeholders.

- We met with our OPP Detachment Board and incorporated the objectives and priorities they determined for the detachment.
- We engaged in dialogue with the Mayor and Municipal Councils in Sioux Lookout and Pickle Lake to discuss community priorities, emerging concerns, and local policing expectations.
- We met with the Chiefs and Councils of Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug, North Caribou Lake, and Wapekeka First Nations to listen to their perspectives on community safety priorities and local policing needs.
- We also met with school boards, organizations representing diverse groups in our communities, businesses, and other members of the public to inform this plan.

The 2026-2029 Sioux Lookout Detachment Action Plan is the first action plan prepared under the CSPA. Detachment Board Annual Reports will continue to be enhanced to reflect the updated reporting requirements.

I am proud of the work we do and the relationships we have built at Sioux Lookout Detachment, and I look forward to our growth and achievements in implementing the 2026-2029 Sioux Lookout Detachment Action Plan.

Our Detachment

The Sioux Lookout Detachment serves the second largest geographical area within the Ontario Provincial Police structure and is responsible for 1,203 kilometres of winter roads, as well as extensive roadways, waterways, and remote air-access locations. In addition to policing the Municipality of Sioux Lookout, the detachment oversees four satellite locations: the Township of Pickle Lake, and the First Nations communities of Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug, North Caribou Lake, and Wapekeka. Each community is distinct, with its own culture, traditions, and policing needs, and together they form an important part of our broader detachment identity. Pickle Lake, Ontario's northernmost year-round road-access township, supports several nearby First Nations. Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug, Wapekeka, and North Caribou Lake are vibrant First Nation communities, and our members work closely with local leadership to understand and respond to community-identified priorities.

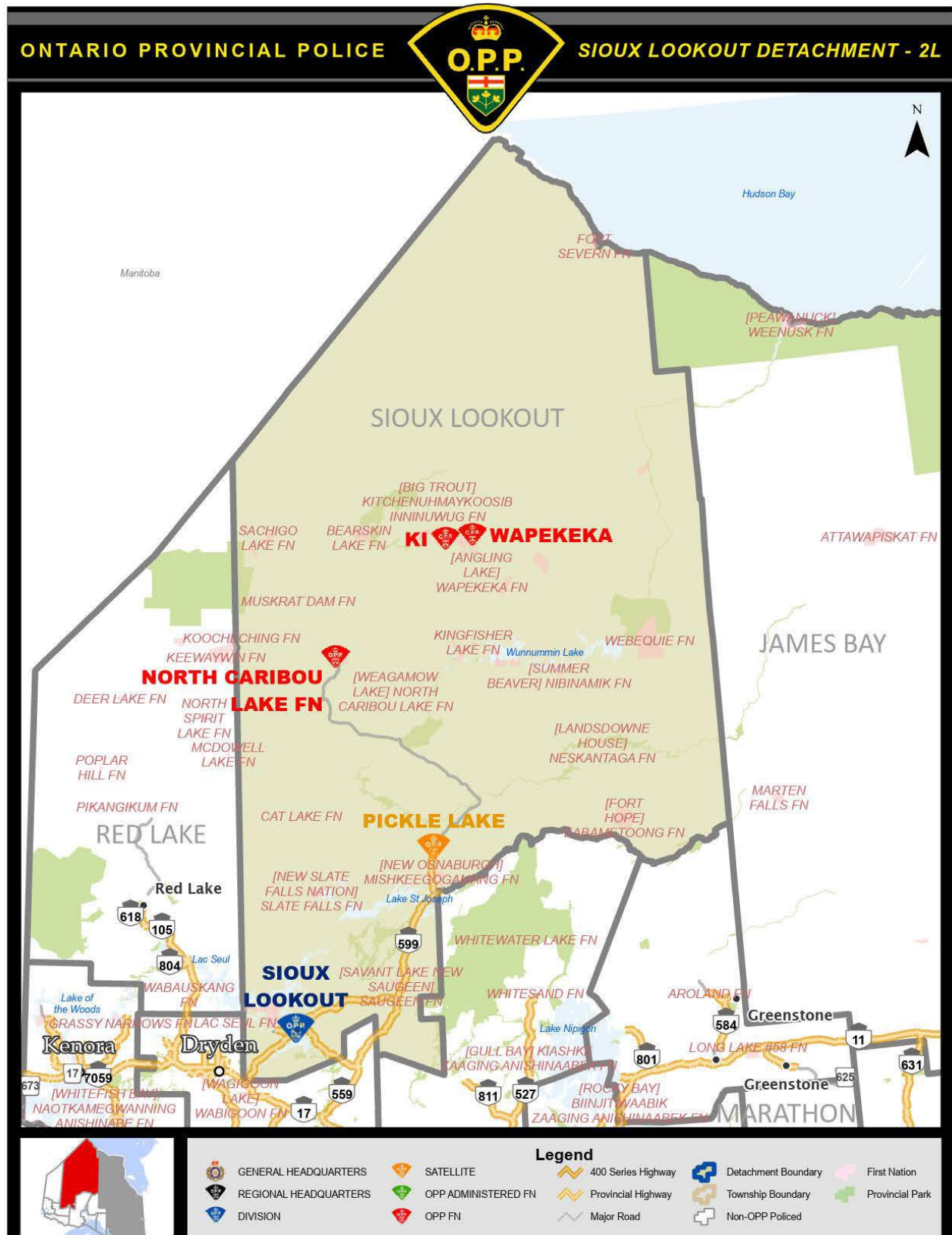
Sioux Lookout is considered the “Hub of the North.” The hospital serves 29 far north First Nations, and several Tribal Councils and federal and provincial agencies are headquartered in town. The Municipality has also signed a Friendship Accord with surrounding First Nations, highlighting a shared commitment to collaboration, learning, and improving overall community well-being.

Our detachment area includes thousands of lakes, many accessible only by air, and is home to numerous tourist camps and outposts that attract thousands of visitors each year. We also work alongside the Nishnawbe-Aski Police Service (NAPS), which operates 13 detachments in the region, and the Lac Seul Police Service, which maintains two detachments. Ongoing cooperation with these services is essential to supporting public safety across the northwest. The sheer size and remoteness of our patrol area create significant logistical and operational challenges, requiring flexibility, careful planning, and strong collaboration across the cluster.

While the region presents unique challenges, it also offers strong partnerships, resilient communities, and meaningful opportunities for collaborative policing. The focus remains on building relationships, supporting community-led initiatives, and working together to foster safe, healthy, and thriving communities throughout the Sioux Lookout cluster.

Our detachment members take great pride in the communities they serve. They are not only police officers but active community members who contribute to the well-being of the communities they serve. Whether volunteering, coaching youth sports, supporting cultural events, or participating in local initiatives with their families, our members are deeply invested in the success and vibrancy of the communities across our cluster. This ongoing involvement strengthens relationships, enhances trust, and reinforces our commitment to community-focused policing.

Action Plan Commitments Summary

Dialed 9-1-1 accidentally? #Be911Ready. Don't hang up, stay on the line and speak with an OPP Communicator to confirm there's no emergency.

The misuse of 911 ties up emergency lines, communicators and officers, which can result in a slower response to a real emergency and risks the safety of people who may need urgent help.

It is against the law to call 9-1-1 as a joke. Prank 9-1-1 calls can be dangerous and waste valuable emergency resources.
