7. ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION/REPORTS

Inspector Kreisz introduced Detective Constable Andrea Degagne, the Detachment Abuse Issues Investigator, who provided an overview of her role at the detachment.

Her job and the 80 other detectives in Ontario are to be subject matter experts in Intimate Partner Violence (IPV), child abuse, elder abuse and sexual assault. This is a way to ensure that, within the detachment, these issues are addressed, in line with policies, but primarily by providing victim support. She investigated 1,400 occurrences in 2025 and is already reaching 500 in 2026.

a. OPP Report/Statistics for the First Quarter, January – March 2026 for Sioux Lookout and Pickle Lake.

Inspector Kreisz presented the first quarter statistics for Sioux Lookout and Pickle Lake to the Board. In addition to various statistics highlighted by Inspector Kreisz, the following were of note:

Sioux Lookout

Community Outreach

- Two Coffee with a Cop events.
- Superhero Day at the Public Library.
- Senior Center visits.
- Fraud Prevention Month in March.
- Engagement with local school leadership to focus initiatives on reducing vaping.

- One Stop Talk program to aim to reduce substance abuse among students.
- OPP Kids Program.

Calls For Service Billing Summary Report

- Overall, Operational and Statutes & Acts CFS are up this quarter.
- Violent Criminal Code occurrences and Property Crime are slightly down this quarter.

Violent Criminal Code

- Assaults and assault with weapon are the main categories that are trending down.
- Sexual assaults are slightly up this quarter.
 - Continue to investigate with the help of the Detective Constable's role.
 - Educating grade 7 and 8 with programs on healthy relationships.

Property Crime Violations

- Break-and-enters and mischief occurrences are trending down
 - Surveillance cameras continue to be helpful in reducing CFS, as well as private security teams circling around town.

Other Criminal Code

- Disturb the peace calls are up significantly this quarter.
 - Most of these calls are associated with public consumption of alcohol.

Operational

- Domestic disturbances and mental health occurrences are trending up.

Traffic

- Impaired driving is trending down, which is lower than what we've had in the past 3 years.
 - Have been prioritizing our Reduced Impaired Driving Everywhere program. From all 5 detachments, we have already conducted over 900 ride checks this year.

Drugs

- Drug trafficking is down overall this year.

Statutes and Acts

- Accepted referrals to victim services are up significantly to over 60% compared to the previous year, which was only 12%.

Detachment Clearance Rate

- Clearance rates in Sioux Lookout for Violent Calls continue to be very high with a 90.4% clearance rate.
- Clearance rate for Property Crimes is trending down this quarter, sitting at 48.5%.

Pickle Lake

Community Outreach

- OPP Kids Program.
- Breakfast Club.
- Fun with Cops.
- Winter Road Initiative.

- Cops and Kids Fishing Derby.

Calls For Service Billing Summary Report

- Overall, CFS are down, and the largest reduction was in our Operational services.

Violent Criminal Code

- Similar to last year with a slight decrease.

Property Crime Violations

- Property Crimes are trending down, which is encouraging, seeing the reduction across all the areas.

Other Criminal Code Violations

- Motor vehicle collisions are trending down this year.
 - This can be the result of the Winter Road Safety Initiative.

Operational

- Unwanted person calls are down significantly this quarter.
 - This can be due to an address in the community associated with multiple past calls that is currently vacant.

Statutes & Acts

- Mental health trend down.
 - Unfortunately, there is a current vacancy in the Crisis Response position. The OPP are continuing to advertise for someone to attend the calls with officers and follow up on mental health calls.

Detachment Clearance Rate

- Clearance rates in Pickle Lake continue to be high with a 94% Violent Crime clearance rate and a 75% Property Crime clearance rate.

b. Update on First Quarter 2026 Expenditures for Sioux Lookout and Pickle Lake

Mireille Poirier gave an update to the Board on the first quarter 2026 expenditures. The three lines used so far from January to April 2026 were as follows:

- Insurance: Annual insurance coverage of \$2,650.
- Membership and Subscription: OAPSB Zone 1 membership of \$652.
- Travel and Training: Various expenses made for the OAPSB Spring Conference and AGM of \$914.

c. Staff Report re 2025-2026 Annual Report to Municipalities – Review of Board Portion of Report; Method to Provide Report to Municipalities

Mary MacKenie updated the Board on the 2025-2026 Annual Report. The Board has already completed a portion of the report; we are currently waiting on the OPP portion, which is in progress. Once the Sioux Lookout Detachment Commander's portion of the Annual Report is received, it will be reviewed by the Board at a meeting, and once both portions of the Annual Report are finalized and consolidated, the full and final report will be forwarded to the Councils of the Township of Pickle Lake and the Municipality of Sioux Lookout for their information.

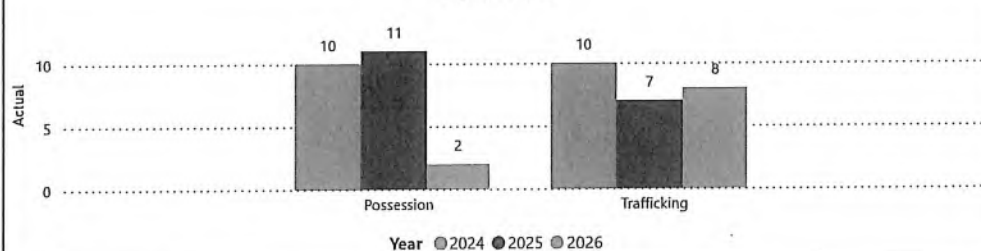

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Message from the Detachment Commander

I am pleased to present the Sioux Lookout Detachment - 2025 Detachment Board Annual Report. This report includes crime, traffic enforcement and community well-being data, and highlights initiatives and successes from the past year. 2025 was the last year of the 2023-2025 Sioux Lookout Detachment Action Plan and this report will provide a final update and progress results from that plan.



The Sioux Lookout cluster represents one of the most unique and complex policing environments in Ontario, spanning remote First Nation communities, rural townships, and the regional hub of Sioux Lookout. Our officers, civilian staff, and part-time members continue to meet these demands with professionalism, dedication, and an unwavering commitment to community safety.

In 2025, our efforts were focused on delivering meaningful results for the communities we serve. Over the past year, we:

- Continued to utilize the Offender Management and Apprehension Program (OMAP) to strengthen offender tracking, warrant execution, and compliance monitoring for high-risk individuals.
- Increased proactive policing through enhanced foot patrols and targeted enforcement informed by community concerns and intelligence-led analysis.
- Maintained a strong focus on traffic safety through year-round RIDE enforcement and the annual Festive RIDE campaign, alongside the continued Winter Road Safety Campaign, with an emphasis on commercial motor vehicle (CMV) enforcement.
- Enhanced victim support services through the addition of a dedicated OPP Victim Specialist, improving coordination of victim services, strengthening follow-up, and ensuring timely access to supports throughout the criminal justice process.
- Strengthened investigative capacity in intimate partner violence (IPV) and other abuse-issues related incidents through a dedicated Detachment Abuse Issues Investigator (DAII), a detective constable assigned to ensure consistency, expertise, and investigative excellence in these complex occurrences.
- Continued to leverage technology, including body worn cameras, in-car cameras, and Automated License Plate Recognition (ALPR), to enhance evidence collection, transparency, and officer and public safety.
- Continued to augment frontline mental health response capacity through our sustained partnership with the Canadian Mental Health Association, including an embedded mobile crisis response worker at the detachment.

- Continued to actively engage with Chiefs and Councils, the Sioux Lookout Detachment Board, and community leaders to ensure our policing approach reflects local priorities and expectations.
- Strengthened recruitment efforts with a focus on attracting local candidates through career fairs, targeted recruitment events, and enhanced social media outreach.
- Continued collaboration with Nishnawbe-Aski Police Service and Lac Seul Police Service to support coordinated, multi-jurisdictional enforcement initiatives.

In 2026, we will release our new 2026-2029 Sioux Lookout Detachment Action Plan. This is the first action plan developed under the *Community Safety and Policing Act* (CSPA). We are working closely with our Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board and engaging with community members to ensure the needs of our communities are reflected in the commitments we make for the next four years.

Development of the 2026-2029 Sioux Lookout Detachment Action Plan will coincide with the creation of the 2026-2029 OPP Strategic Plan creating organizational alignment.

As we look ahead to emerging challenges and new opportunities in policing and community safety, our detachment members remain committed to our mission to serve our communities, protect our citizens, uphold the law, and preserve public safety.

Supported the reduction of repeat minor property crime by connecting individuals with appropriate community resources and diversion opportunities, including partnerships with NAN Legal Services and the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS) Youth Probation to address underlying factors and promote long-term behaviour change.

In 2025, we continued to prioritize the “Big Four” causal factors in motor vehicle collisions including impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving, and lack of seatbelt use through data driven enforcement and targeted deployment in identified high risk areas. We also remained committed to year-round RIDE enforcement as a core traffic safety strategy and are pleased to report that our cluster led the province in the number of RIDE checks conducted during the 2025 Festive RIDE campaign, reflecting the strong commitment of our frontline members to road safety and impaired driving enforcement.

To identify co-response solutions for non-police related demands for service that impact police resourcing.	Worked closely with Meno-Ya-Win Health Centre, SLFNHA hostel management, and the Sioux Lookout Emergency Shelter to support vulnerable individuals, improve shared response to incidents, and ensure more appropriate use of police resources for low-risk calls for service. Continued collaboration with NAN Legal Services and MCCSS Youth Probation to support diversion-based approaches for appropriate offenders. Also supported community by-law enforcement initiatives led by Sioux Lookout By-Law, helping to redirect matters away from the criminal courts and reduce low risk demands on frontline policing. Continued active participation in the Situation Table, working with partner agencies to respond to individuals at acutely elevated risk to support coordinated interventions that reduce repeat emergency service involvement and enhance individuals' safety. Worked alongside Mobile Outreach and Indigenous Friendship Centre partners to connect individuals experiencing addiction, mental health challenges, and housing instability with supports, helping to address root causes of repeat police contact. Continued partnership with the Canadian Mental Health Association through the embedded mobile crisis response worker, who supported frontline officers by responding directly to individuals experiencing mental health crises and connecting them with appropriate community-based services, contributing to more effective diversion from police-only responses and improved continuity of care.
Prioritize recruitment of individuals who reside within our service area.	Continued to prioritize the recruitment of individuals residing within our service area by actively engaging local communities through career fairs, targeted recruitment events, and outreach initiatives. These efforts focused on building awareness of policing career opportunities, encouraging local applicants, and strengthening long-term retention through the value of local knowledge, community connection, and investment in the communities we serve.

Other Community Updates

- **Crime Prevention Initiatives:** Delivered targeted crime prevention programming, including a fraud awareness presentation at the Senior Centre and ongoing public education focused on personal safety, awareness, and crime prevention strategies.
- **Mental Health and Vulnerable Persons Response:** Strengthened multi-agency response to vulnerable persons through collaboration with mental health and outreach partners, including NODIN Outreach, and support for individuals experiencing addiction, mental health challenges, and housing instability through coordinated service pathways and referrals. Victim Specialist and DAll embedded in detachment screened vulnerable person files and ensured referrals to appropriate supporting services.
- **Community Patrol and Public Space Safety:** Worked collaboratively with Sioux Lookout Meno Ya Win Health Centre, SLFNHA hostels, and community outreach partners to address concerns related to loitering, substance use, and safety in public and private spaces, while supporting safe access to essential services for clients and staff.
- **Youth Engagement and School-Based Initiatives:** Maintained strong engagement with youth through school-based programming and presentations across the cluster, along with participation in youth-focused activities, such as the North Caribou Lake and Pickle Lake Cops and Kids Ice Fishing Derbies, and other initiatives promoting positive relationships, mentorship, and early intervention.
- **Collaborative Community Partnerships:** Continued collaboration with key community partners including the Indigenous Friendship Centre, First Step Women's Shelter, and Sioux North High School leadership, including support to students accessing external services, such as the Ontario Native Women's Association.
- **Community Safety Planning and Justice Collaboration:** Advanced local justice and violence prevention initiatives through ongoing engagement with Crown, Victim/Witness Assistance Program, and Probation Services, including development work toward a High-Risk Domestic Violence Table to improve coordinated responses to IPV and high-risk cases.
- **Crime Prevention and Community Outreach:** Maintained ongoing public engagement through community events and outreach initiatives, including Stuff-A-Cruiser in support of First Step Women's Shelter, Santa Claus Parades in Sioux Lookout and Pickle Lake, Cops and Kids Story Time at the Public Library, and career and community presentations aimed at strengthening trust, visibility, and community confidence in policing.
- **Program Development and Funding Initiatives:** Submitted a regional application for Footprints Northwest Phase III funding to strengthen victim support pathways and enhance culturally appropriate services for survivors of abuse in Sioux Lookout and surrounding communities.

Policing Hours

The OPP has developed a Service Delivery Model (SDM) in response to several reviews and audit recommendations. The SDM is designed to:

- Promote officer wellness through balanced workloads
- Determine adequate staffing levels at each detachment
- Ensure the continued delivery of adequate and effective policing services in accordance with the *Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA)*

To support SDM implementation, the OPP is undertaking a multi-year staffing strategy to address required increases in detachment personnel. This model supports the OPP’s ability to:

- Respond effectively to increasing calls for service
- Maintain safe communities through proactive patrols and community engagement
- Meet municipal expectations for police visibility

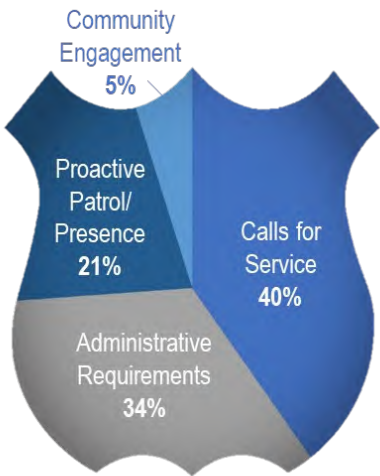


Figure 1: Service Delivery Model Provincial Target

To monitor progress and guide detachment-level planning, the OPP has established time allocation targets for provincial constables (Figure 1). These targets reflect how time should ideally be distributed by the end of the SDM staffing strategy.

The targets are based on a provincial average, and variations are expected between detachments due to differences in geography, operational structure, recruitment and leave of absence rates.

Detachments may face challenges in achieving these targets, but progress is expected as scheduling, data quality and strategic deployment continue to improve.

Our Detachment

The Sioux Lookout Detachment serves the second largest geographical area within the Ontario Provincial Police structure and is responsible for 1,203 kilometres of winter roads, as well as extensive roadways, waterways, and remote air-access locations. In addition to policing the Municipality of Sioux Lookout, the detachment oversees four satellite locations: the Township of Pickle Lake, and the First Nations communities of Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug, North Caribou Lake, and Wapekeka. Each community is distinct, with its own culture, traditions, and policing needs, and together they form an important part of our broader detachment identity. Pickle Lake, Ontario's northernmost year-round road-access township, supports several nearby First Nations. Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug, Wapekeka, and North Caribou Lake are vibrant First Nation communities, and our members work closely with local leadership to understand and respond to community-identified priorities.

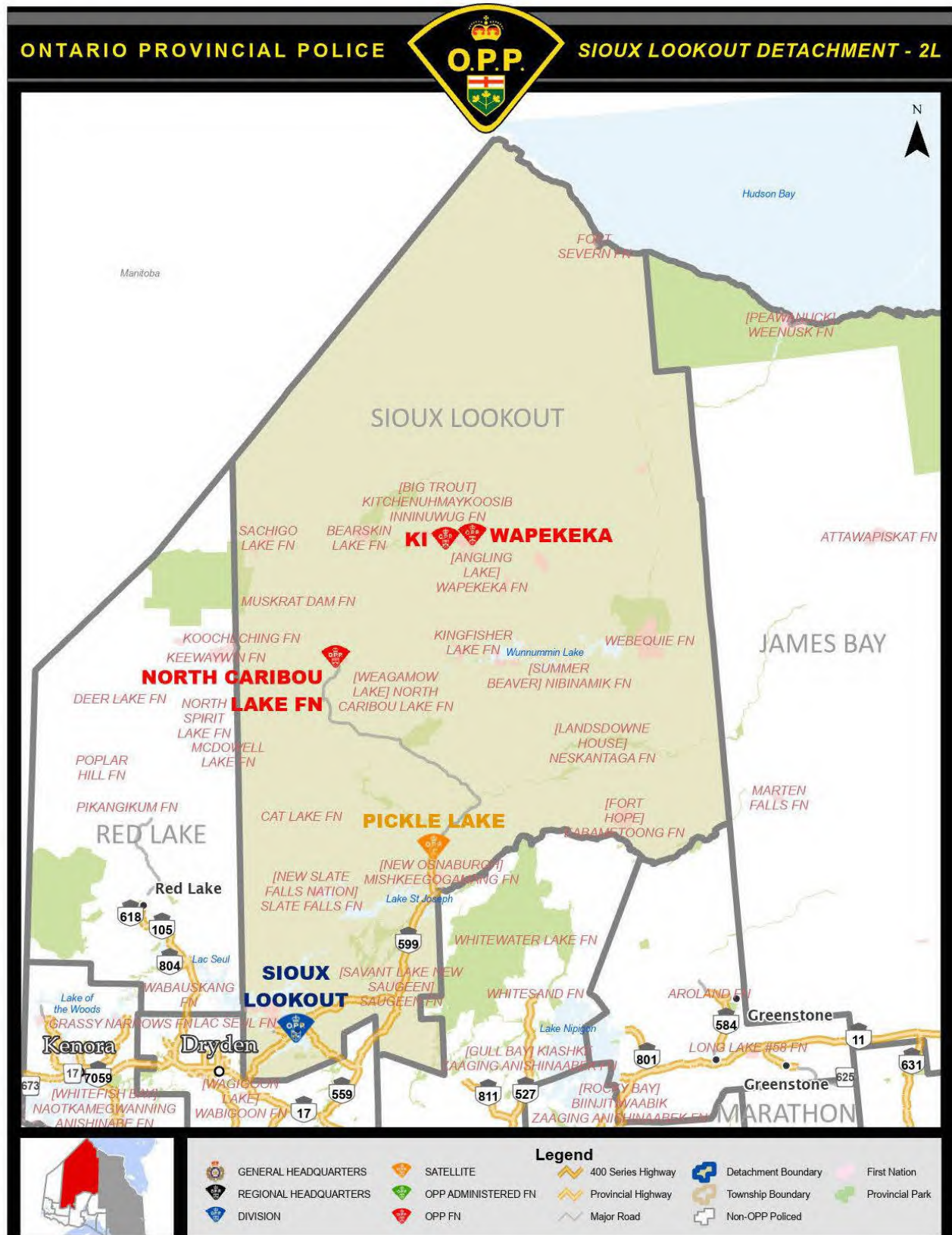
Sioux Lookout is considered the “Hub of the North.” The hospital serves 29 far north First Nations, and several Tribal Councils and federal and provincial agencies are headquartered in town. The Municipality has also signed a Friendship Accord with surrounding First Nations, highlighting a shared commitment to collaboration, learning, and improving overall community well-being.

Our detachment area includes thousands of lakes, many accessible only by air, and is home to numerous tourist camps and outposts that attract thousands of visitors each year. We also work alongside the Nishnawbe-Aski Police Service (NAPS), which operates 13 detachments in the region, and the Lac Seul Police Service, which maintains two detachments. Ongoing cooperation with these services is essential to supporting public safety across the northwest. The sheer size and remoteness of our patrol area create significant logistical and operational challenges, requiring flexibility, careful planning, and strong collaboration across the cluster.

While the region presents unique challenges, it also offers strong partnerships, resilient communities, and meaningful opportunities for collaborative policing. The focus remains on building relationships, supporting community-led initiatives, and working together to foster safe, healthy, and thriving communities throughout the Sioux Lookout cluster.

Our detachment members take great pride in the communities they serve. They are not only police officers but active community members who contribute to the well-being of the communities they serve. Whether volunteering, coaching youth sports, supporting cultural events, or participating in local initiatives with their families, our members are deeply invested in the success and vibrancy of the communities across our cluster. This ongoing involvement strengthens relationships, enhances trust, and reinforces our commitment to community-focused policing.

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board authorizes _____ to attend the Police Governance Ontario (PGO) Zone 1 Annual Conference, on November 4, 2026, in Thunder Bay, with necessary expenses allowed.

PURPOSE:

For the Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board to consider sending a Board Member and/or Staff to the Police Governance Ontario (PGO) Zone 1 Annual Conference, November 4, 2026, in Thunder Bay, and to approve the expenditure.

BACKGROUND:

The Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board is a member of the Ontario Association of Police Service Boards (OAPSB), now called Police Governance Ontario (PGO) as of April 13, 2026. Throughout the implementation of the *Community Safety and Policing Act*, PGO has provided invaluable training, resources, advice, information and one-on-one consultation to staff.

In addition to that support, PGO also held its Spring Conference and AGM June 1-3. Originally, Kyra Marshall was to attend the OPP Detachment Board Portion of the Conference on June 1 and 2; but, due to unforeseen circumstances, Kyra was unable to attend at the last minute. However, the Board could participate in PGO's Zone 1 Annual Conference, being held jointly this year with the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP), November 4, 2026, in Thunder Bay.

The OPP Regional Financial & Administrative Assistant, Katherine Fergusson, reached out in March of this year to invite the Board to participate. A "Save the Date" calendar hold was also sent to Staff this June to confirm the details of the Conference.

The Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board have been attending the PGO Zone 1 Annual Conference for the past two years. Based on our experience and past meetings with PGO, it is expected that useful information will be shared at the meeting, not to mention the ability to network with members of other Detachment Boards in the Zone 1 area to obtain some “local and regional” perspectives. Additionally, the perspective from the OACP will likely be both informative and insightful.

Based on the Board’s Rules and Procedures regarding Travel Expenses and subject to how many Board Members and/or Staff attend, anticipated expenses are outlined, and various scenarios are presented in the attached document entitled “2026 PGO Zone 1 Annual Conference Costing and Options.”

In accordance with the Board’s Rules and Procedures, to maximize the value of attendance at events, a Member/Staff shall provide a report (verbal or written) that includes highlights of sessions/events attended at the next scheduled Detachment Board meeting. The report should also include proposals for any actions/ideas for the Board’s consideration that the attendee believes could be implemented by the Board/Staff to increase its effectiveness.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

The estimated total cost to send one Board Member/Staff member is approximately \$1,248.22 to \$2,761.76, depending on the chosen Option. It also depends on who the Board authorizes to attend, that is, whether they’re a Board Member or Staff (no Per Diem for Staff), transportation specifics, travel date, etc.

The Board’s Travel/Training/Professional Development Budget for 2026 is \$7,000. Since January, we have used approximately \$4,530.37, leaving the remaining \$2,469.63 to cover the cost of attendance by a Member or Staff at the PGO Zone 1 Annual Conference.

TITLE: Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board 2027 Budget

RECOMMENDATION (MOTION):

THAT the Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board recommends to the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Sioux Lookout and the Council of The Corporation of the Township of Pickle Lake that the 2027 Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board Budget be approved.

PURPOSE:

The Purpose of this report is to present the 2027 Draft Estimates/Budget for the Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board to the Board for consideration, approval in principle, and recommendation to the Councils of Pickle Lake and Sioux Lookout for approval.

BACKGROUND:

Section 71(2) of the Community Safety and Policing Act requires that the Board's Estimates/Budget be submitted to every municipality that receives policing from the detachment along with a statement of the municipality's share of the costs.

A draft of the 2027 Estimates/Budget is attached for the Board's consideration.

DISCUSSION:

There are no changes between the 2026 Budget and the 2027 Budget. Highlights are as follows:

Advertising, Community Engagement/Community Outreach, Community Safety & Well-Being Plan Implementation

- The 2026 Budget included increased funds for higher advertising costs and potential community engagement and outreach related to the development of the Local Action Plan (LAP) and Community Safety and Well-Being Plans, such as meeting room rentals, etc. However, the funding wasn't required to this point in the year. Despite these additional funds not yet being required in 2026, the 2027 figure remains the same in anticipation that the Board may conduct community engagement and outreach related to other activities as the Board moves into more governance activities.
- DB meetings are being advertised, as required by legislation, in Sioux Lookout's weekly newspaper, The Sioux Lookout Bulletin.

Membership Fees

- 2027 Membership Fees for Police Governance Ontario (PGO) (for training, information and resources), and Zone 1 are due January 31, 2027, and will be charged to the 2027 Budget. We have not received the 2027 invoice yet; however, estimated cost breakdown is as follows: PGO General Membership -- \$641.35 + \$83.37(HST) = \$724.71; PGO Zone 1 Membership -- \$150.00; TOTAL -- \$874.71 (including HST).
- Additional funds included for potential membership in other organization(s).

Remuneration – Provincial Appointee

- Although we have included \$2,000 in the Budget for Remuneration, the Board does not currently have a Provincial Appointee. If this money is not spent, it will not be billed to the Municipalities.

Remuneration – Staff Support

- The Board's Rule and Procedure regarding Support Staff, states as follows:
 - 1.3 For the first year of operation of the Sioux Lookout OPP Detachment Board, the Administrator shall be the CAO/Municipal Clerk of the Municipality of Sioux Lookout, the Deputy Administrator shall be the Town Clerk of the Township of Pickle Lake, and the Recording Secretary shall be the Executive Assistant to the Mayor and the CAO/Municipal Clerk of the Municipality of Sioux Lookout.
 - 1.4 Detachment Board work shall be absorbed into the regular duties of the three positions with no additional compensation provided by the Board; however, Support Staff will be reimbursed for approved expenses in relation to their duties in accordance with the Board's Rules and Procedures.
 - 1.4.1 This arrangement will be reviewed after the first year of the Detachment Board's operation.

- Staff costs for Detachment Board activities have been absorbed by Sioux Lookout since approximately October 2023. Time has been spent getting the Board's "administrative apparatus" established during the first two years of the Board.
- In 2025, the Detachment Board Staff conducted a review of the above-noted arrangement. As a result, funds were included for Staff Support in the 2026 Budget. This amount has not changed for 2027 since Staff does not anticipate any decrease in workload.
- In fact, in the third and subsequent years and, as the Board becomes more comfortable in its role and, in order to "operationalize" its Roles and Responsibilities and move more into its role of "governance", (for example, its involvement in the development of the Local Action Plan, and eventually its involvement in the performance evaluation of the Detachment Commander), it is becoming increasingly apparent that additional time is required to keep up with the work required to continue to keep pace with the activities and the ongoing work.
- In addition, with the Inspector General of Policing and the Inspectorate of Policing having come "online", Detachment Board Staff is noticing more correspondence coming from that agency, along with related and supporting advice from Police Governance Ontario on recommended action by Boards. This is increasing the work required to review and analyze the information and provide relevant information to the Board.

2026 Actuals are estimated.

Quarterly Billings/Payments are based on actual costs incurred. If an expense isn't incurred, it won't be billed to the Municipalities. There should be no Deficit or Surplus at the end of the year since only actual costs are billed.

Once the Board approves the Estimates/Budget, in principle, it will be forwarded to each of the Municipalities (Pickle Lake and Sioux Lookout) for approval by their respective Councils.

As noted in the Partnership Agreement, the apportionment of costs is 50-50; therefore, each Municipality should budget approximately \$21,702.50 for its portion of Detachment Board costs.

All members of a municipal police service board who will be running in the upcoming municipal elections in October 2026 should review [O. Reg. 408/23: Code of Conduct for Police Service Board Members](#).

Likewise, members of an Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachment board should review [O. Reg. 409/23: Code of Conduct for O.P.P. Detachment Board Members](#).

The ministry advises that a board member should disclose to the police service board or OPP detachment board their decision to be a candidate in a municipal election as soon as possible. Police service board members appointed by Lieutenant Governor in Council (LGIC) or Minister, as well as OPP detachment board members appointed by the Minister must inform the ministry as soon as possible. Please contact Gita Ramburuth, Appointments Officer, Training Strategy and Development Unit, Public Safety Division at gita.ramburuth@ontario.ca and Minister.SOLGEN@ontario.ca.

Board members who are candidates in the October 2026 municipal election should also consider whether being a candidate creates a conflict of interest as defined in O. Reg. 408/23 and O. Reg. 409/23. "Conflict of interest" is defined as a situation in which the board member's private interests or personal relationships place, or may reasonably be perceived to place, the member in conflict with their duties as a member of the board. If a board member does have a conflict of interest, they must promptly disclose this.

In addition, they must not participate in discussion of or voting with respect to matters at board meetings if they have a conflict of interest in the matter.

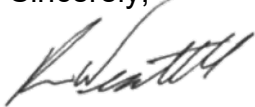
A police service board or OPP detachment board may have its own rules and procedures related to the political activity of its members that should be reviewed. Police service boards and OPP detachment boards may develop rules or procedures pursuant to s. 46 (1) and s. 67 (6) of the [Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019 \(CSPA\)](#).

Should a board member be elected to local office, the board member should consider notifying their police service board or OPP detachment board immediately, to determine next steps. Should a police service board member appointed by LGIC or Minister, or OPP detachment board member appointed by the Minister be elected to local office, the board member must notify the ministry immediately.

Inspector General of Policing (IG), Ryan Teschner, will be issuing an Advisory Bulletin in the coming weeks outlining key statutory obligations for police service board members and OPP detachment board members under the CSPA and its regulations, with a particular focus on board accountability and compliance requirements, as well as other applicable legislation.

Advisory Bulletins constitute the IG's advice pursuant to section 102 (4) of the CSPA and are intended to serve as a resource for the sector by offering the IG's general interpretation of various provisions of the CSPA. This Advisory Bulletin will be distributed by the Office of the Inspector General.

SUBJECT: Inspector General Memo #11: Notice of Issue – Increase in Antisemitism
and Hate-Motivated Incidents

Under the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA), the Inspector General of Policing has a duty to monitor and advise on the delivery of adequate and effective policing in Ontario, including taking steps, where necessary, to support compliance with the CSPA and its regulations.

As part of this role, I have established the **Notice of Issue** as a mechanism to identify and call attention to issues relating to the delivery of policing and police governance that, if left unaddressed, could negatively impact community safety and public confidence in policing. It is intended to support early awareness and action by police services and police service boards and to promote alignment with the requirements of the CSPA and its regulations.

I am using this mechanism for the first time to highlight a sustained increase in hate-motivated incidents across Ontario, including a significant and disproportionate rise in incidents motivated by antisemitism. Crime data and sector information indicate a marked increase in hate-motivated incidents in recent years, with Jewish communities remaining the most frequently targeted group nationally. In Ontario, these incidents have escalated in some cases to include more serious criminal activity. Additionally, the Inspectorate of Policing (IoP) has received complaints of antisemitic hate-motivated incidents occurring in the context of public protests.

I want to acknowledge the considerable work already undertaken by police services and boards across Ontario to respond to the rise in antisemitic hate-motivated incidents. This work has been carried out under challenging and often evolving circumstances, including the impacts of broader geopolitical events that have heightened tensions within communities. It has required the sustained commitment of resources and personnel, often under significant operational pressure. I also want to recognize the ongoing engagement with Jewish communities. These efforts are essential to strengthening responses, supporting those most affected, and maintaining public trust and confidence in policing.

Engagement with the Sector

Given the significance of this issue, I have taken a number of steps as part of my statutory monitoring and advisory role, including requiring several police services and boards to provide data to support an analysis of current responses to antisemitic hate-motivated incidents. This work has been supplemented by a review, conducted by the Inspectorate of Policing's Centre for Data Intelligence and Innovation, of external data sources and relevant research to identify key trends, challenges, and leading practices.

Building on this foundation, on June 15, I convened a meeting with chiefs of police and police service board chairs from 14 police services serving communities with significant Jewish populations. The meeting also included the Commissioner of the Ontario Provincial Police, representatives from the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police and Police Governance Ontario, and Jewish and community organizations.

The discussion focused on how police services and boards are, and have been, responding to the rise in antisemitic hate-motivated incidents that are targeting Jewish communities, informed by data and insights gathered through the IoP's ongoing monitoring work. This included consideration of the appropriate use of available legal authorities—such as *Criminal Code* provisions, provincial offences, and municipal by-laws—to address conduct that threatens persons, property, and public order.

Participants also shared approaches to crime prevention, public order policing, and intelligence and information sharing, as well as strategies to support victims and strengthen engagement with impacted communities. The meeting provided an opportunity to identify actions and practices that are proving effective, and also identify those that can enhance the policing response to hate-motivated incidents, taking into account local needs and circumstances.

This engagement, together with ongoing monitoring and analysis, will continue to inform the IoP's work in this area.

Expectations of Police Services and Boards and Next Steps

I recognize that police services and boards have taken meaningful steps to respond to the sustained rise in antisemitic hate-motivated incidents, including reallocating resources and implementing new measures. This work is important and should continue. At the same time, the current environment requires sustained attention to ensure that policing remains adequate and effective, consistent across the sector, and responsive to the needs of affected communities.

Police services and police service boards are expected to **review the Notice of Issue and take its findings and identified actions into account in their operational and governance decisions**. The Inspectorate of Policing will continue to monitor this matter and will look to collect data and information in the future to evaluate how the actions in the Notice of Issue have been implemented.

In terms of next steps, I am grateful to the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police and Police Governance Ontario for agreeing to play a role in supporting police services and boards in make the ongoing implementation of these actions a priority, including coordinating a consistent approach to implementation, while recognizing the need for local variation where appropriate.

SUBJECT: Inspector General Memo and Advisory Bulletin #4.1:
Political Activity -- Police Service Board Members &
OPP Detachment Board Members

As part of my advisory role under section 102(4) of the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA), I am writing to provide information and advice regarding political activity by members of police service boards and OPP detachment boards.

In advance of the upcoming municipal elections, questions may arise regarding the extent to which board members may engage in political activities while continuing to fulfill their governance responsibilities with boards.

The CSPA requires police service board members and OPP detachment board members to comply with each of the applicable Codes of Conduct. These Codes are regulations — that is, they have legal force — and, among other things, establish standards of conduct that may apply when members participate in political activities.

These Codes are set out in:

[Ontario Regulation 408/23 \(Code of Conduct for Police Service Board Members\)](#); and
[Ontario Regulation 409/23 \(Code of Conduct for OPP Detachment Board Members\)](#).

While political activity is not prohibited, board members must ensure that activities in which they engage do not:

- conflict with their statutory duties as board members;
- create actual or perceived conflicts of interest between their role as board members and their political activity;
- compromise their impartiality as board members; or,
- undermine public confidence in the board or the police service.

The enclosed Advisory Bulletin #4.1 is being released in line with my statutory duty to provide advice to the Ontario policing sector concerning compliance and performance. The Advisory Bulletin provides an overview of the legislative, governance, and ethical considerations applicable to board members who participate in political activities or seek elected office. It also highlights key compliance, conflict-of-interest, accountability, and public trust considerations to support effective governance and informed decision-making.

Advisory Bulletin 4.1: Political Activity – Police Service Board Members & OPP Detachment Board Members

Date of issue: July 24, 2026

What you need to know

1. Board members are governed by prescribed Codes of Conduct

The Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019 (CSPA) requires police service board members and OPP detachment board members to comply with prescribed Codes of Conduct. The Codes of Conduct are set out in:

- [Ontario Regulation 408/23 \(Code of Conduct for Police Service Board Members\)](#)
- [Ontario Regulation 409/23 \(Code of Conduct for OPP Detachment Board Members\)](#)

These Codes apply to all board members and establish conduct standards that may be engaged when members participate in **political activity** (e.g., campaigning, canvassing, attending partisan events, fundraising).

2. While political activity is not prohibited for board members, it must not conflict with board duties or undermine public trust in the board or police service

The Codes of Conduct do not contain standalone provisions related to political activity. However, they **require board members to take certain actions** where they are in a conflict of interest (defined below) and not conduct themselves in a manner that undermines, or is likely to undermine, public trust in the board or the police service.

Political activity by a board member **may raise concerns** where it:

- creates (or reasonably appears to create) a conflict of interest;
- involves speaking on behalf of the board without authorization;
- uses confidential/non-public information obtained through board duties;

- uses the member's position to benefit themselves or someone with whom they have a personal relationship (e.g. uses their official title (e.g., "Police Services Board Member") in their own election campaign materials or when publicly endorsing another candidate, creating the impression that the endorsement carries the authority or support of the board.); or,
- otherwise risks the board member or board failing to comply with the CSPA or its regulations.

This list is **not** exhaustive.

3. Key Code of Conduct provisions commonly engaged in relation to a board member's political activity

a. Public trust

Members must not conduct themselves in a way that undermines or is likely to undermine public trust in the board or the police service (subject to limited good-faith considerations).

b. Statements and communications

Members must not knowingly make false statements relating to board duties, must not purport to speak on behalf of the board unless authorized, and must clearly indicate when expressing a personal opinion when commenting on matters related to the board, the service it maintains or members of the service.

c. Confidentiality and information handling

Members must not access, collect, use, or disclose information obtained in the course of their board duties contrary to law, including the CSPA, and must not disclose to the public information obtained through board duties except as authorized by the board or as required by law.

d. Conflicts of interest and recusal

Both Codes of Conduct define "conflict of interest" broadly to include any situation where a board member's private interests or personal relationships, place, or may be reasonably perceived to place, the member in a conflict with their duties as a board member. Board members must make an individual assessment when determining whether a conflict does in fact exist, or may be perceived to exist by a reasonable member of the public. There may be instances where the prudent course of action for a board member is to err on the side of caution where there is uncertainty as to whether a conflict may be perceived to exist.

Where a conflict of interest exists, a board member is required to promptly disclose the conflict, and refrain from participating in discussion or voting with respect to the matter at a board meeting. Members should also be mindful of other applicable legal duties, including the *Municipal Conflict of Interest Act* (where applicable).

e. Using the position for benefit / advantage

Members must not use their position to benefit themselves, benefit someone with whom they have a personal relationship, or interfere with the administration of justice. An example of where this may be engaged is where a board role/title is used to advance a political candidate or campaign, solicit support, or create the impression of institutional endorsement.

4. Intersection with police officer political activity rules (for awareness)

Ontario Regulation 402/23 (Political Activity) restricts the forms of political activity that a police officer may engage in. While this regulation does **not** apply to board members, board members should be aware of these restrictions and ensure they do not engage with police officers, including command officers, in a manner that may result in that officer contravening the restrictions on political activity set out in this regulation. For example, a board member who is a candidate in a campaign for political office should not seek the attendance of a local chief of police at their political campaign event.

5. Misconduct disclosures and the IG complaint process

Where a board member reasonably believes another board member's conduct constitutes misconduct, the Codes of Conduct require disclosure to the board chair, or if the misconduct involves the chair, to the Inspector General of Policing (IG). As part of their statutory mandate, the IG receives and investigates complaints about board member misconduct.

What you need to do

1. Keep political activity separate from your board member role

When engaging in political activity (e.g., campaigning, canvassing, attending partisan events, fundraising), ensure that you do not act so as to create the impression that you in your capacity as a board member, or the board as a whole endorses a candidate/party/position or that the police service is aligned with a political campaign.

Seeking advice: If you are unsure whether a proposed activity could create a real or perceived conflict of interest, raise concerns about public trust, involve the use of board resources, or otherwise engage your Code of Conduct obligations, seek advice as early as possible. Board members may wish to consult the board chair (or vice-chair), the board's professional staff, their municipal clerk (for election-related rules), the municipality's or board's legal counsel, as appropriate, and their Inspectorate of Policing Police Services Advisor. General IG guidance and resources are also available on the Inspectorate of Policing website ([IG Advisory Bulletins](#)).

Recommended practices:

- Do not use board or police service letterhead, email or social media accounts, contact lists, meeting time, or resources for political purposes/activity.
- If your board title appears in a biography, ensure it is accurate and accompanied by clear language that you are not speaking for the board at a political event.
- Be cautious about social media posts that may undermine public trust, including those that reference the board or police service in the context of political activity by a board member.

Boards and members should be mindful of broader election-related rules that may apply in their context, including:

2. Align your conduct with the Code of Conduct rules on statements

If you speak publicly on policing matters while engaged in political activity, ensure that your statements and other communications, including social media posts and public comments, comply with the Code of Conduct:

- Do not represent that you are speaking for the board.
- Clearly indicate when you are offering a personal opinion.
- Avoid statements that could reasonably undermine trust in the board or police service.

3. Identify, disclose, and manage political conflicts of interest

Political activity may create an actual or perceived conflict of interest where a member is a candidate, organizer, fundraiser, or endorser in an election, or where a member's political activity relates to matters that may come before the board. For example:

- **Using the board role in political activity** (e.g., campaign messaging or advocacy) may suggest influence over or pre-judgment of matters that may come before the board.
- **Fundraising, organizing, or endorsing a political campaign** tied to policing issues may give rise to a real or perceived conflict (e.g., advocating for increased police funding or decisions the board must consider).

Where the Code of Conduct conflict of interest definition is met, members must:

- Promptly disclose the conflict of interest to the chair (or to the IG if the conflict involves the chair).
- Disclose the conflict of interest on the record at the next board meeting after disclosure.
- Not participate in discussion or voting on the matter (for which there is a conflict of interest) at board meetings.

4. Protect confidential/non-public information

Do not use or disclose information obtained or made available to you in the course of your duties as a board member, including for political purposes. **Address alleged misconduct promptly.**

If you reasonably believe a board member's political activity constitutes misconduct under the Codes of Conduct, disclose it to the chair, or to the IG if it involves the chair. A disclosure to the chair constitutes a complaint under section 106 of the CSPA. The board chair must forward this information to the IG in accordance with section 108 of the CSPA and applicable IG guidance.

What we will do

The Inspectorate of Policing will use information received (including disclosures and complaints relating to board member conduct) to support the IG's mandate, including by monitoring compliance and determining whether an investigation or other action is appropriate.

Where allegations of misconduct are received, the IG will review the information and circumstances to determine the appropriate response under the IG's complaint-handling and oversight framework.

The Inspectorate of Policing will continue to provide sector guidance and resources to support boards in complying with the CSPA and its regulations and maintaining public confidence in the civilian governance of policing.

Political Activity: What Board Members Need to Know

Political activity is permitted, but board members must avoid conflicts of interest, protect confidential information, and maintain public trust.

Do

- ✓ Keep campaign activity separate from your board role.
- ✓ Use accurate biographies with a disclaimer that you are not speaking for the board.
- ✓ Be cautious with social media posts that reference the board or police service.
- ✓ Seek advice if unsure about conflicts, public trust or board resources.
- ✓ Ensure any personal views expressed align with Code of Conduct obligations and do not undermine public trust.

Don't

- ✗ Use board letterhead, email, contact lists or resources for politics.
- ✗ Use your board title to advance a campaign or imply board endorsement.
- ✗ Post content that creates the impression your board member role is being used for political campaign purposes
- ✗ Assume that using your personal account means there are no Code obligations.
- ✗ Use confidential information obtained through your board duties for political purposes.

If political activity creates a conflict (actual or perceived), members must:

1. Promptly disclose it
2. Disclose it on record at the next board meeting
3. Not participate in discussion or voting on the affected matter
